

Many of these items will be on display in the Community Hall in an exhibit of the Town of Northport to celebrate the town's 150 year anniversary. The exhibit was curated by Beverly Crofoot. It will be on display until the end of July.

#### **OUR TOWN NORTHPORT**

#### Maine Celebrates 200 year of Statehood

Maine, originally part of the royal charter for the Massachusetts Bay Colony, was granted statehood on March 15, 1820, becoming the 23d state to join the Union. This occurred as part of the Missouri Compromise, an act that balanced the entry of Missouri into the Union as a slave-holding state with the addition of Maine as a free state.

Northport was earlier a part of the tract of land, originally given to forty noblemen, knights and gentlemen, the "Plymouth Council", in 1620 by King James I. This Council made a grant of land to General Samuel Waldo. The Waldo Patent was later acquired by Henry Knox in 1792. In "If These Cottages Could Talk", William Cressey writes that "in 1795, the residents petitioned the Commonwealth of Massachusetts [Maine not yet being a State] to establish Northport as a separate town... The Act creating the Town of Northport is dated February 13, 1796."

On display in the meeting room at Community Hall is a display of holdings from the Bayside Historical Preservation Society, the Belfast Museum and the Penobscot Marine Museum. Photos from PMM's collection of glass plate negatives show Northport from the early 1900s. Some may recognize the Northport Diner, which later became Dos Amigos and is still happily patronized by today's residents as The Hoot.

And who knew that Blue Dolphin Antiques was formerly the original Perry's Nut House?

Down East has an illustrated article about some of the 187 surviving buildings built before Maine became a state. One is the Black Horse Tavern built in 1795 on the east side of the Passy. https://mainehomes.com/maines-bicentennial-homes/

Want to see more of Maine's pre-1820 homes? The Maine Historic Preservation Commission highlights one on each business day of this year as part of Maine's bicentennial celebration. Visit <u>maine.gov/mhpc</u> to see the entries, which will also be cataloged in a searchable archive.

During this pandemic, we thought it would be interesting to discover what was happening in The Belfast/Northport area during the 1918 Flu. We reached out to Megan Pinette from the Belfast Historical Society and she sent us this post from the BHSM this past February.

The death toll in Belfast from the Spanish Influenza pandemic in 1918- 1919 was substantial. From History of Belfast in the 20th Century: "In October, 1918 the worldwide influenza epidemic hit Belfast hard. Schools and public places were closed for most of the month, and victims were generally cared for at home so as to not spread the contagion further. Thirty died, the largest number of deaths ever recorded in the city in one month. When the official figures came out for the year, eight had died from influenza directly and 27 had died from pneumonia, which often follows the flu." That was just for 1918, illness and deaths continued into 1919. It's one thing to look at the numbers, here is one of those lost.

Arthur N. Johnson, noted for his fine tenor voice - described in his obituary as" clear, soulful and satisfying voice uplifting us on the wings of song" died, age 30, on September 23, 1918 in Brockton, Mass. He had left Belfast in 1917 to study voice under the direction of Stephen Townsend of Boston. He is buried in Grove Cemetery. He was survived by his parents, his widow Ethel and their young son Maurice.



#### COLLECTORS SHOW and ANNUAL MEETING

BHPS held a Collectors Show early in August 2019. Several members displayed what they collect and talked about them with visitors. Mary Ann Stankewicz showed art education books; Barbara Dugin displayed dolls; Joy and Rob Sherman had a collection of pig objects and photos; John Dykstra showed and explained postcard photos of Bayside and its surrounds, which he had donated to BHPS last year; John Palombo displayed rock/stone maps he has created; David Crofoot showed decoys, Joe Reilly had a display of antique pocket maps from the 19<sup>th</sup> century; and Dick Brockway displayed some of the house and cottage models he has made over the years. Visitors exclaimed that the event was interesting and enjoyable and should be repeated again this year. Who can imagine the range of what people collect?

This was the second year that BHPS has held such a show. It is becoming an annual event. BHPS plans to hold it again in the summer of 2020, probably, again, in early August.
