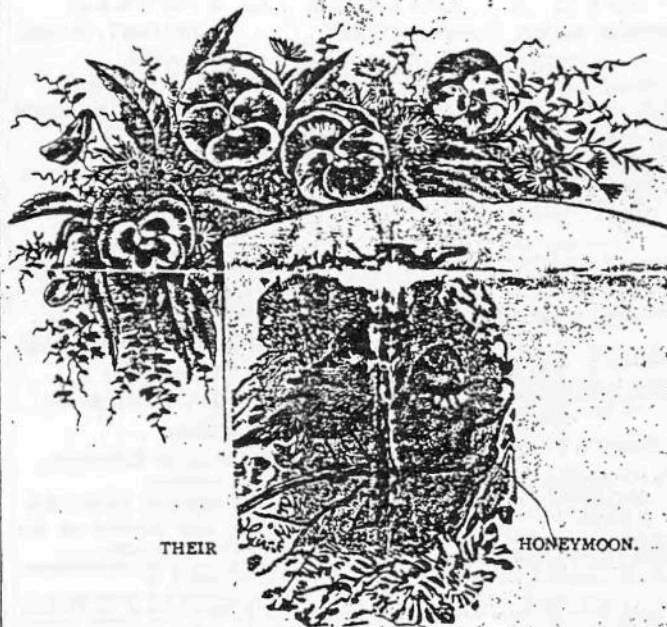

NORTHPORT BY THE SEA.

Historical and Descriptive. How to Reach There, and its Surroundings.

Among the many pleasant little summer seaside resorts with which the coast of Maine is dotted, there is no one more pleasantly located, easily and quickly reached, thoroughly drained and shaded, or possessing more quiet and yet all the conveniences of life, than our little Northport by the sea. It is but a few years since our quiet, cosy, little seaside resort where old ocean rolls in his waves at our feet, and the cooling breezes sigh through shady groves on the shores of the grand old Penobscot bay, was little more than an unbroken wilderness.

Thirty five years or so ago the Methodists located here in the beautiful grove for camp-meeting purposes and have held annually ever since, but it is within a few years, and with the growing fashion for spending summer vacations at the seaside that attention was turned toward Northport, as a desirable place for summer residences.

As the place became better known, and its attractions of pure air, cleanliness, quietude, conveniences of access, and all other virtues which go to make up a pleasant and needful place of resort, were fully understood, it began to grow, until it has become so thickly studded with cottages as to resemble a city, while all along the shore, the movement has kept pace, and the shore, almost from Belfast city to Saturday Cove down the bay, is thickly dotted with cottages, and many residents, many of them from the city, have found it well as

The old Camp-ground has been outgrown. The shore has grown up, and still further down the shore below the "Bluffs," another little village has sprung up termed Temple Heights, where the Spiritualists have located a camp-ground, built a fine wharf, several nice cottages, &c., and a new town road just finished connects the two grounds and all along shore from Belfast to the "Cove," and furnishes a most beautiful drive along the sea shore.

The view from Northport seaward, is beautiful and romantic, for the whole broad expanse of Penobscot Bay lies before us—a bay which travelers say rivals the far-famed Bay of Naples, dotted here and there with the white sails of lumberladen vessels from Bangor, or swift flying sailboats, and daily with majestic steamers plowing past and sending billowy, surfy waves breaking with hollow roar against the shore, while at the south the islands stand guard to keep out the rough Atlantic storms.

One of our greatest advantages is our location and the conveniences for reaching here or leaving at short notice, which will be fully appreciated by business men. The Boston and Bangor boats touch at our wharf twice daily, small steamers connect us with up river, across the bay, and the islands, and the Maine Central R. R. trains reach Belfast twice daily connecting here by hack or steamer. Telephonic connection with all parts of the country.

The drives in the vicinity are not excelled, the fishing even along shore is fine, bathing good, rowing safe and roomy, and the sailing privileges cannot be surpassed. The sudden and dense fogs which render the eastern shore and even Bar Harbor so disagreeable to many, are not so common here.

Among the places of interest in the vicinity are:—Belfast four miles up shore, a very pretty New England village with its tasty residences,

broad, shaded streets, and fine drives; Fort Point 15 miles to the northward and at the mouth of the Penobscot where it is always cold enough to wear an overcoat; Camden 14 miles down shore via the turnpike road through the mountains, a route only surpassed by the White Mts.; Bluehill across Penobscot bay, with its copper mines now largely deserted; Castine also across to the eastward with its forts in ruins and its almost primeval solitude; Islesboro, and other islands down the Bay, beautiful lakes and villages in the near inland, and not the least our own Mt. Percival located between the two Camp grounds, towering hundreds of feet above the sea level, and so near that its summit can be reached easily by foot or carriage, and from which a view looking seaward can be obtained which travellers say cannot be surpassed and has but few equals in the world.

BAR HARBOR.

A correspondent of the Bangor Commercial writes of the great down east summer resort:—"Month of my heart, thou dawnest here," is the sentiment of hotel proprietors of Bar Harbor. August, or never, is the time for an influx of visitors. There were more arrivals this week, including last Saturday night, than any three weeks together have brought before this summer. This may be attributable to more than one reason. The weather has been excessively hot in the large cities south and west of here; and then, William H. Vanderbilt swelled the number of natural curiosities here this week.

Why does Vanderbilt come here instead of going to Newport, as has been his practice for the last ten years? Because Bar Harbor is now considered even more exclusively the place for moneyed mushrooms from our large cities than even Newport. In New York, money does not signify with the old Knickerbocker bloods. It is true, gold with beauty will buy the title of an English peer, and it will buy the presidential chair in America oftentimes, but it cannot purchase pedigree, nor yet can it fill the place of common sense or good breeding. After all we may say or think, regarding the equal or unequal distribution of the good things of this life, it would be a difficult task to undertake to better them. As a rule those who have the most money are not blessed with much else that is desirable.

But how does this all apply to life Bar Harbor? Why it is just here in a nutshell. The place in three years from now will be shut off to all but a few money kings of America. These public ways will be in the hands of the land company who have bought them up for the express purpose of selling again at four times the price paid the original owners, to those who will build palaces and lay out grounds to be fenced in even to the roads which pass through from one point of interest to another. If this company cannot get an ell they will take an inch. If the town authorities deny them one request to shut off public highways they try another.

Five years ago the young people wore fannel suits—both sexes—all day, scoured the country in search of the treasures of the island to take to their winter homes, and went down to see the Lewiston and City of Richmond come in in the afternoon, laden with fresh supplies of young society. Friend greeted friend on shore, and those who had been here for a week or two, told their newly arrived friends what a jolly unconventional go-as-you-please place they had come to. Well, those times have gone by forever. What little pleasure and freedom the great masses get out of Bar Harbor now they can make much of, for it will not be for them many years longer. Everything points in that direction. The charity ball in New York is not a circumstance for stiffness and formality with the snobbish and ultra fashionable dances given at the Malvern. But most of these affairs are gotten up by cottagers, and are therefore supposed to be very select. It is considered quite the thing at these gatherings for both sexes to drink all the champagne they can hold, although the guests of other hotels are religiously excluded from these very select gatherings. But the West End hops are very social affairs, and have not so far conformed to the tyrannical rule of the Grundy family as to require the participants to observe the conventional walk through the figures, which the more ultra fashionable effect. But hops are no longer what they were three years ago here, any more than are other amusements and pastimes.

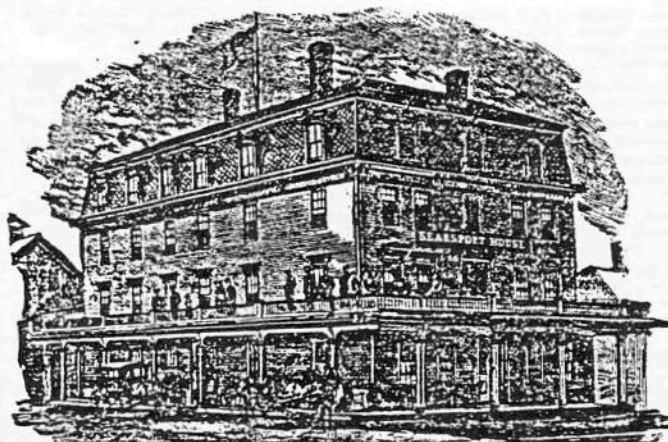
