SEA SIDE RESIDENTS.

There is a great difference in the kind of residents and owners of property at Maine seaside resorts. At Bar Harbor, for instance, the owners and residents are wealthy men and there is no room for chance for men of moderate means and small salaries to live, or hardly any at night, so exorbitant are hotel prices. In Old Orchard the population is largely transient—comers and goers from the cities of Portland, Saco and Biddeford. Here at Northport the residents nearly all own their cottages, and consequently have more than a temporary interest in the place. In but a few instances does one man own more than one cottage, and property is comparatively low. There are no costly buildings or wealthy millionaire residents with their airs and high-and-mighty ways, but all are on a level, and a man with a few days to spend, and dollars to spare in giving himself and family a vacation and a sniff of salt air, here finds a congenial opportunity.

The time has gone by when a home by the seaside was possible to the wealthy only. Men of abundant means and elegant leisure still show their love for the beautiful and the natural in erecting and occupying homes in the most delightful spots on beach and rock, but these structures are far outnumbered by those owned and occupied by men of the middle class—men who may see their way to fortune, or who have the happy faculty of making a small income go a great way in providing for their necessities and enjoyments. These dwellers by the sea rapidly increase in numbers with every season, and they are much more comfortably housed than many of their more affluent neighbors suspect. Within a few years our Maine coast has become strewn with small villages occupied as summer resorts, but in which life would be endurable the entire year. Of such is Northport.

We can realize the beauties of bathing at the famous summer resort at Coney Island, N. York, by the following extract from a correspondent's letter:—"Oh, I am so fond of Coney Island. I can find surf composed exclusively of salt water at almost any seaside resort. But Coney Island is the only place I know of where you can enjoy the mingled pleasure of dashing through breakers made up of stable refuse and water in about equal parts, with the still keener delights of dodging frequent cats of wholly unnecessary maturity, and tomato cans that have outlived their legitimate field of usefulness. I shall go to Coney Island every day this summer."

Good Templars visiting or stopping at Northport are notified that Sea View Lodge No. 20 meets Monday evenings at the foot of the big hill just northerly of the land entrance to the grounds, Chas. Baker No. 24 at Saturday Cove, three miles below the grounds, on Tuesday evenings, and Belfast No. 30 at the Universalist Vestry, Belfast, Thursday evenings, and you are cordially invited to visit and all of them.

Mr. F. A. Dickey, one of the town officers of Northport, furnishes the following figures, which will be of interest to us cottage tax-payers:—Valuation of the Camp-Ground for 1881, \$16,905; No. and So. Shore, \$5,250; Total Valuation, \$22,155. Cash tax, at 2 cts. and 1 mill on a dollar, \$465.25. Highway tax, 1 cent on a dollar, \$221.55. Total tax, \$686.80. The highway tax should be reckoned at 75 cts. on a dollar when paid in cash, and a large portion of it is expended on the Grounds. Whole valuation of town in real estate, \$149,655; personal property, \$23,440; total, \$173,095. Number of taxable polls, 204. Amount of money raised, (cash tax,) \$4,145. Population, 872.

There is no seaside resort on the whole coast of Maine which provides such unparalleled conveniences for communication with the rest of the world as Northport. Bar Harbor, Squirrel Island, Old Orchard, &c., are nowhere in comparison. A ride of thirty minutes reaches the depot at Belfast, where trains leave twice daily over the Belfast and M. H. rail road, connecting with all parts of the country. The steamer from Belfast to the Islands and Castine touches daily, the Ralph Ross, from Bangor and up-river, arrives regularly Saturday evenings and Sundays, and the huge Boston steamers make daily landings, both from the east and west. This convenience of access, and leaving for home if business requires, is an important matter, which deserves more attention than is given it, and is a convenience which business men, especially, appreciate.
